LOCATION. Forcing nature to yield that which is evidently a poor return for our labor, is at best poor policy, and yet this is exactly the course many cultivators of the soil are constantly pursuing; for they cannot understand why a crop should be grown at a profit in one locality and not in another.

Successes and Failures

If a man reads in the newspapers an account of the immense profits realized by certain parties in the cultivation of any particular kind of fruit or grain, he says I can do what others have done, and to prove it he immediately commences an investigation in relation to the culture, cost, and prospectgive price in market; and if these appear satisfactory, he embarks in the enterprise, with every expectation of realizing a profitable return for the labor and capital invested. But with all the energy usually displayed in such cases, and with abundant capital, and a soil and climate, apparently favorable, a disastrous failure may be and often is the result, in consequence of an anfavorable location. We use the word in its broadest sense, for it may apply to climate, soil, markets, or even to sections of the country where laborers cannot be obtained in sufficient numbers to do the work required.

It is true that more failures result from negligence on the part of cultivators than from other causes; still there "are instances innumerable where no human precaution or care could prevent a failure after an enterprise was Tonce begun. We have only to cite the many failures in grape culture caused by selecting an unfavorable location for the vineyard.

Farmers as well as fruit growers often make a great mistake in undertaking to grow certain crops for the purpose of competing with those men who are more favorably situated than themselves. A man who has to depend upon railroad communication must not expect to grow heavy, bulky crops like potatoes, hay, and coarse vegetables, and successfully compete with others who can send these articles to market by water. But it is not necessary that we should enlarge upon this ("point, for every "observing man must be aware that upon location depends in a great measure the success or failure of almost any enterprise in either horticulture or agriculture; and what should these lessons teach if not that every farmer should grow those particular crops which succeed best in his locality, or, in other words, those that will return the greatest profit? Let those who are in favorable locations for growing apples continue to plant trees and extend their orchards until the markets are fully supplied. Farmers who can grow wheat successfully should never discard its culture for the sake of trying some other grain of






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
