Republican County Convention. A Convention of the Union Republicans of Huntingdon county, will be held in the borough of Huntingdon, on TUESDAY, August 3rd, 1870, at 1 o'clock, p. m.

This Convention will be composed of two delegates from each township, borough, ward and district. The Republican voters of the county are requested to meet at their respective places of holding elections...

The Blair County Radical has charged us with denouncing the Morrell Bessemer steel business. We have not said a word upon that subject. There must be something wrong or the editor of that paper, one of Morrell's organs, would not see ghosts.

Who is to be our candidate for Congress this fall?—Cremor's Republican. More than likely the nominee of the Democratic party will be your candidate this fall.

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There are Republicans outside of the county who cannot see why the disorganizers have had an influence to disorganize the party. Such are informed that all the most important and very near all the smaller offices filled in and from the country through the influence of Mr. Scott and Mr. Morrell, have been filled in the interest of the disorganizers.

The Blair County Radical says that Mr. Morrell is supported for a third term by two of the three wings of the Republican party in this county. But two wings of the party are known to the voters here—the wing that supported the regularly nominated ticket last fall, and the wing headed by Mr. Scott, and supported by the Republican, Mr. Morrell's office-holders, and others reliable only when they themselves are candidates for election.

The Disorganizers at work in Cambria County.

We see by Mr. Morrell's organ at Johnstown, that in Cambria county Mr. Morrell's friends will support upon the same ticket with him, (if nominated) James Potts for Assembly. Mr. Potts is and always has been a straight-out Democrat of the most rabid kind, and if he should be elected, and he most likely will, he will work for the advancement of Democratic measures, including free trade, during the session.

The Chairman of the County Committee should be required to obey the instructions of the Convention and to act in harmony with the State Committee. With a united front, pledged to the support of the ticket, the party will come out of the campaign victorious; but with another disorganizer to lead, repudiated by the State Committee as Mr. Logan was and is, the party cannot expect success.

Believing it to be the duty of every man who either is or claims to be a member of the Republican County Committee to yield more personal considerations for the sake of the party and the principles which he represents, I now propose to join with you in a general call.

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We don't believe that Mr. Morrell seriously thinks of being a candidate for election for a third term. His "situation" is such that defeat would be almost certain. We believe he is a candidate only to help have from defeat at the next delegate elections the guerrilla leaders in this county.

We see that Mr. Cloyd, elected Co. Treasurer last fall, is in town, and it is supposed he will remain here until after this meeting of the Republican Convention, to try to make believe that he and not Mr. Logan is the Co. Treasurer. The price Mr. Logan has promised for playing into the hands of the disorganizers and Democrats is receiving.

France and Prussia at War.

Cable dispatches announce that a war is now raging between the powerful governments of France and Prussia. The difficulty, or pretense for the difficulty has grown out of the desire to choose a king for Spain—last month the throne being abdicated by Isabella II. A number of "eligible" princes have been applied to but none agreed to take the throne, when General Prim saw that one of the Kings of Portugal's sisters was married to Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern, a Prussian, who was willing to accept.

Congress.

From the Philadelphia Register. HUNTINGDON, July 6, 1870. Gentlemen: I give in an article in the Register on the occasion of our next session, the statement that nobody has been elected from this part of the State for a third term for more than forty years.

Hon. Daniel J. Morrell has connected himself actively with the question of the removal of the county seat from Blain to this city. He and his friends, and himself are supporting a Democrat for the Legislature, on that question, and who will if elected, vote with his party in favor of the redistricting of the State in the next year.

THE WAR IN EUROPE.

PARIS, July 15.—There is great agitation here, many demonstrations in favor of the Emperor, and a demonstration during the night. Crowds of students and others paraded the streets, and boulevards shouting vive vive, down with Prussia &c. Some persons who protested were pelted and insulted.

PARIS, July 15.—The dissensions in the French Cabinet were ended in an unanimous declaration of war on the Emperor. The Emperor will hold a permanent council of his Marshals and Ministers at the Tuilleries.

PARIS, July 15, 2 P. M.—Despatches state that the French have declared war, and that Prussia is already moving her troops.

PARIS, July 15, 8 P. M.—The Corps Legislatif declared war against Prussia at ten minutes before two o'clock.
