A Railroad Horror.

Accident on the Maine Central Railroad-Two Persons Killed, Thirty Wounded. BANGOR, August 9 .- A frightful accint occurred to-night on the Maine Cer dent occurred to night on the Maine Cen-tral railroad, just as the train was entering this city, by the giving away of the bridge across Hawden road.
