1. The applicant for a hotel of saloon license must be a citizen of the United States.

2. He or she must be of good repute for honesty and temperance.

3. At least twelve good citizens of the ward or towaship must sign the petition, stating to the court that the place is necessary for a hotelor saloon for the accommodation of the public, and that the applicant is a citizen of the United States, and is of good repute for honesty and temperance.

5. The applicant must give a bond, with wo sureties, conditioned for the faithful observance of all laws relating to the sale of liquor, and, upon the violation of any such laws, the bond to be forfeited.

Any person or persons may object or remonthe ground that the applicant is not a fit person to whom a license should be granted, or that place is not necessary for the accommodation of the public.
