

Farm and Household.

Agricultural Alphabet.

ALL farming does not consist of holding the plow, driving the mowing machine or digging potatoes.

BY draining warm your soil; by manure, enrich it; by rotation, economize it; by improved stock, make the most of its products.

CORN fodder should never be forgotten in your calculations for the summer work, especially if you keep milk cows.

DEBT ought usually to be avoided, but when a man sees that by borrowing a certain sum he can increase the value of his farm twice the amount, debt becomes good policy.

ENGAGE farm hands early, so as to get the best men. One good hand is worth three poor ones, and to get these farmers will have to pay as much as they can get at other employment.

FENCE posts and stone walls that have been heaved by the frost, gates and doors that have been broken by the winds, and all small repairs, should be looked after now before the pressure of the planting season.

GOOD farming requires the thorough working of the soil. The best farmer we know employs on a farm of 240 acres eight hands the year through, and twice this number in planting time and harvest. He makes it pay.

HARROWING the meadows as soon as the frost is out is an excellent practice. A harrow with short, fine teeth, is better than the ordinary harrow.

INCREASE if possible your supply of water for your stock, by deepening springs or making new ones. Remember the lessons of the two past seasons; a scarcity of water seriously lessens the flow of milk.

JUDICIOUS management at this season is often required to make the hay hold out. Cutting and mixing in a little straw stalks, and if possible a few roots, and soaking the whole with hot water, will add at least one fourth to its capacity.

KILL the caterpillars and save your apple orchards. The eggs can now be seen in rings around the small branches near the tips. Each ring contains from two to six hundred eggs. Cut them off and burn them.

LIGHT crops must be expected from light manuring and high cultivation. Nine out of ten farmers would find it to their profit to put into twenty acres the manure and cultivation they now put into thirty.

MATCHES are a great convenience, but by carelessness are often the cause of fire. Always keep them in a tin box, and never drop one after using until your are sure every spark is extinguished.

NOT until farmers club together and buy at first hands will they get the full value of the money they expend for implements, fertilizers, seeds, etc. Co-operation is economy.

ORDER your seeds early and test them to ascertain how large a proportion will sprout. You may thus save yourself from planting a whole field with dead seed.

PEAS make a most excellent fodder crop; can be sown early on wheat land and taken off in time to put in the wheat crop.

QUINCE currant, blackberry and other shrubs should be well trimmed up before the sap begins to flow. With blackberries and raspberries all the old canes should be cut out.

ROLL the wheat fields as soon as the frost is out of the ground. The frost lifts many of the roots out of their bed; STUDY up the subject of forage crops, and decide what to put in. The two past seasons have demonstrated the folly of depending wholly upon pasture for summer forage.

TOP dress the meadows with fine compost, and the wheat fields with a little ash. An early and vigorous start for all plants is the best assurance against failure.

UNIFORMITY of growth in wheat and other grains is best secured by making the seed bed very fine and drilling in the seed. Less seed is required and the crop is usually increased.

VALUABLE additions are constantly made to our varieties of wheat, corn, potatoes, &c., but it is not best for ordinary farmers to invest largely in new seeds until their value is decided.

WILLARD, the great dairyman, says that bran and oat meal are the best feed for dairy stock in the spring. Corn he pronounces injurious to their value in this season.

YOUNG men who think of leaving the farm for a city life should remember that, after all the hurry and worry and wear of a business life, not one merchant in ten succeed in making wealth.

CUT WORMS.—It is very annoying, after having set out a nice lot of sweet potato or cabbage plants, to see them cut down, one by one, by these worms. We have tried ashes, lime, soot, and in fact almost everything we have ever heard of, but never found anything effectual until, by accident, we found three or four worms, one morning, gathered under a small board which had been left by some children on a sweet potato hill.

Acting upon this hint, we placed small pieces of board, large chips, &c., all through the patch; and we tramped them by hundreds. The boards must be lifted early in the morning, and on very warm days, again about noon. A little care, for a few days, will clear these pests out of a garden. One trial will satisfy any person of the merits of this plan.

We believe that the best fertilizer of any soil is the spirit of industry, enterprise, and intelligence—without this, lime, gypsum, and guano will be of little use.
