[GENERAL NATURE—No. 81.]

AN ACT defining and limiting the appropriation of certain moneys for the preparation, issue, and reissue of the securities of the United States, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the expenses of the issue, reissue, transfer, delivery, redemption, and destruction of securities, legal tender notes, fractional currency, checks, certificates, commissions, and for any plate and seal engraving and printing required by the Treasury Department, shall be paid from and shall not exceed the appropriation of one percentum of the amount of legal tender notes, fractional currency and securities issued during each fiscal year: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to inincrease or enlarge the appropriation contained in the secution of the act entitled "An act to authorize the refunding of the national debi," approved, May 23, 1872.
