GRAIN—The Wheat market has been flat and prices have steadily dropped until they are now fully 50 lower than the close of our last issue. Sales of 30,000 bushels common and choice Pennsylvania and Western red at \$1,00@1,70; amber at \$1,75@1.82, and white at \$1,90@2. 1200 bushels Ryo sold at 75c for western and 80c for Pennsylvania. Corn has declined, and meets a limited demand on this occasion. Sales of 50,000 bushels yellow at 65c, and western mixed from 61@62 cents, closing at our lowest figures. Oats have met a fair inquiry, but closed dull and lower. Fully 70,000 bushels changed hands at 38@40c for black, 40@41c for mixed, and 42@45 for white. Of Barley, about 30,000 bushels western and Canada sold on secret terms. We quote the former at \$5c and \$1. In Barley Malt no change.
