[GENERAL NATURE-No. 71.] N ACT to amend an act entitled 'An act toestablish and to protect national cometeries," approved February twenty second, eigeteen huadred and sixty seven.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Rep-ntalises of the United States or America in Con-ress a sembled, That the Servetary of War is wreby auch read to select the sup in-endents of the national cometeries ir m aeritorious and truskworthy seldiers, either enteriors and trustworthy soldiers, either ommissioned officers or emissed men or he vo'u.'t er or regular army, who have even hon-rably mustered out or discharged rom the service of the United States, and who may have been disabled for active field service in the line of duty.

SEC. 2. That the superintendents of the autional cemeteries shall receive for their ompensation from sixty do lars to seventy ive dollars per month, a conding to the xtert and importance of the cemeteries owhich they may be respectively assigned, to be determined by the Secretary of war; and they shall also be furnished with purious and final, as now provided at the several cemeteries.
