Grant, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by law, do hereby declare and ac-claim that on and after the 1st day of Oc-tober next, so long as merchandise import-ed into France in vessels of the United States, whether from the countries of its origin or from other countries, shall be ad-mitted into ports of France on the terms aforesaid, the discriminating duties here-tofore levied upon merchandise imported into the United States in French vessels, either from 'the country, shall be and are hereby discontinued and abolished. In testimony whereof, I have heremito sature hand and cursod the call of the

Done at the city of Washington this 22d day of Septem-ber, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and of the independence of the United Statets of America the ninety eight.
