Our entire purchases of goods from Cuba during the year amounted in value to \$67,720,205, or 85 per cent. of the entire export of this island; while at the same time, owing to the restrictions and impediments imposed by Spain, the purchases of American goods by Cuba amounted in value to only \$13,168,968, leaving a balance against us amounting to \$54,551,274.—
The duty on American flour in Cuba, for example, until quite recently, was \$10 50 per barrel, and even now shippers assert that "it is more profitable to send flour from New York to Spain, and thence to Cuba, than to ship it direct from the United States to Havanan."
