large variety of native trees; but there is not sufficient for the country. The manner in which lumber is being cut, without the forests being replaced in the east, also points to the time when, if trees are not planted, the lumber crop of the prairie planted, the lumber crop of the prairie States will be a matter of much moment to the country at large.

In Nebraska timber grows with astonishing rapidity; and, if the farmers of the country are equal to the opportunities, not many years will elapse before the treeless prairie is adorned with waiving woods, the lumber of which will add largely to the revenue of the owners of the soil.

Trees are now being planted in Nebraska by the millions. The Hon. J. Sterling Morton, of Nebraska City, Otoe County, has been one of the pioneers in the tree planting movement. He originated the idea of setting apart one day in each Spring to the special work of tree planting. The first "arbor day" was in 1874, and on that day two million tress were planted .-In 1872 and 1873, "arbor-day" was dropped, but it was recommended to the farmers to choose for themselves a day in April, and set it apart for tree planting. This year, however, the State Board of Agriculture has determined to go back to the original plan. It has been resolved that "arbor-day" shall be the second Wednesday in April; and the State Legislature is to be asked to make the day a legal holiday. Each owner of land is recommended to plant at least one tree; and the State Board will award a premium to the person who plants the largest number. It is now the custom of the Board to give a premium

## Housing the Family Carriage.

There is a common and very vexatious complaint from parties who store their carriages in the same building with their horses, or in damp carriage-houses, of poor varnish. This will happen even after the best material and varnish have been used, for no varnish can stand the action of the steam arising in a stables where herses are kept. When a varnished carriage is exposed to an atmosphere of ammonia, arising from manure or decaying vegetable matter, the alkali unites with the oil of the varnish, forming an almost imperceptible filament of soap, which, when the carriage is washed, dissolves in the water, is removed, leaving a fresh surface to be again acted on by the ammonia, so that the oil is gradually removed from the varnish, leaving the brittle gum to look like rosin and crumble away. Therefore, a dry, clean carriage-house, entirely separated from the stable, or stable manure, is the first thing required, and secondly, to have it revarnished when it is required, which is often as once a year, if the carriage is continually used.

## Soot for Cabbage Fleas.

As soon as our readers begin to work in the garden we shall begin to hear complaints of the injury being done by cabbage and turnip fleas. In time let us say that a dusting of the plants with soot is when you have occasion to clean out your chimneys, stove pipes or stoves where soot accumulates more or less, save all you can FULL DIRECTIONS ON THE LA. and put aside in some dry place for a time of need. Put all your fine dust-like ashes in with the soot, and in spring sift out all the lumps, adding an equal quantity of dry earth or sand to the pure article. every barrel of this compound add one pound of powdered sulphur, thoroughly mixing it through the heap.
