Notice:

ARTICLE VII, SECTION 1. NEW CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Senators and Representatives and all Judicial, State and County officers, shall before entering on the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation:

I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support, obey and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this Commonwealth, and that I will discharge the duties of my office with fidelity; TAAT I HAVE NOT PAID OR CONTRIBUTED, OR PROMISED TO PAY OR CONTRIBUTE, RITHER DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY, ANY MONEY OR OTHER VALUABLE THING, TO PROCURE MY MOMINATION OR ELECTION (or appointment), except for necessary and proper expresses expressly authorized by law; TRAT I MAYE NOT RECONNEYS TOLATED ANY ELECTION LAW OF THIS COMMONWHALTH, OR PROCURED IT TO BE DONE BY OTHERS IN MY BEHALT; that I will not knowingly receive, directly or induredly, any money or calculate thing for the performance or non-performance of any act of daily persisting to my office, other than the compensation allowed by law."

OBJUST OF AN PERSON DURSTAN, UNITED STATES OF THE STATES O

SECTION 8. Any person who shall give, or promise, or offer to give to an elector, any money, revard or other valuable consideration for his vote at an election or for withholding the same, or who shall give or promise to give such consideration to any person or party for such elector's vote, or for the withholding thereof, AND ANY LECTOR WHO BHALL RECEIVE OR AGREE TO RECEIVE, FOR HIMSELF OR FOR ANOTHER, ANY MONEY, REWARD, OR OTHER VALUABLE CONSIDERATION FOR HIS VOTE AT AN ELECTION, or for withdrawing stands, shall thereby forfeit the right to vote at such election, and any elector whose right to vote that be challenged for such causes before the election officers shall be required to swear or aftern that the challenge is untrue before his vote shall be recorded.
