The hog is accustomed to a great variety of food. He will eat animal and herba ceous food alike-there is nothing that comes amiss to him, and he thrives upon all. To select food for him, then is not the thing. Though you can fatten them on one kind of food, you cannot do it economically. Take what breed you like, and it is economy, in producing the greatest results from a given amount of foodthat is the point that gives the profit in heg husbandry. The cheapest food then, is to be sought if it answers the purpose. By the cheapest we mean also that which he relishes and thrives upon. Corn alone, though the great hog feed-made a special. ty-is not the most advantageous. The exception to this is the West, where corn is very cheap. But even here, other grain and feed added, will produce a better growth of muscle and fat. All animals in part of require a variety of food, and the hog is no exception. His appetite then will be satisfied, and all the wants of his system supplied. Grass in summer suits him; he revels in a clover field. Milk suits him the whole year round, and assists a rapid growth. Milk contains a great variety of elements in solution, and is an aid to the digestion of the more solid food. He likes vegetables, but for the most concentrated and richer food. Though a "hog," he is governed by the same physiological principles as other animals, and is, therefore, liable to disease-to many ailments; but most of these are caused by abuses in management. Where he is well attended to, and supplied with a variety of good feed, he seldom suffers from disease.

## Pork-Raising.

A correspondent of the Germantown Telegraph says: "My own theory of porkraising, based upon experience, observation, and probably a little philosophy of things, if written for the benefit of others. would be about as follows: During the hot summer months I would feed very little solid feed, such as scorn in the ear or WATCHES uneracked. I would keep hogs upon green feed constantly, either grass, oats, or rye, and feed them at regular intervals, once er twice a day, upon mashed feed, either shorts, chopped oats, or rye, buckwheat, etc., fed in troughs. When fed in this way, and allowed access to water and shade, hogs will bear crowding through the het months-a very good time, if not the best, to take on flesh. This puts them in the best of condition for corn feeding, which should commence about the first of Pure Wines and Liquors for Medicinal Purposes September, when the new crop is still soft and tender. Treated in this way hogs become probably as perfect as any method could make them. Upon the whole, I believe it is the cheapest and most econom-

## Peaches Every Year.

A reader of the Farmer tells us of a peach orchard a few miles sout of Richmond, Indiana, visited by him a short time ago, which has borne good crops reg- ATJOURNALSTATIONERY STORE. ularly for the last six years. The pecu. liarity in the management of the orchard is in banking up the trees. The bodies of the trees for a distance of two feet or more are covered with earth, which slopes gradually away to the level ground. This bank of earth prevents injury from winter BLANK BOOKS, all kinds, thaws and keeps back the bloom till danger from frost is over in the spring; at least this is our explanation for the regular bearing of this remarkable orchard .--The plan should be generally adopted by all who have peach trees in this latitude.

GREASE SPOTS .- To remove grease spots, fly specks, &c., from oil cloth, and window shades, rub the soiled spot with a clean woolen rag wet in the water of ammonia. It will remove them without injury to the color or texture.

LEMON PIE. -One lemon cut fine, rind and all; one cup of water or sweet milk one cup of sugar; one egg; two tablespoons of flour; corn starch is better. Bake with or without crust.
