DEATH OF SAMUEL HENRY.—He is Killed by the Pittsburg Express—His Body Found on the Track at Woodvale this Morning—The Sad Ending of a Useful and Honorable Career—Full Details of the Terrible Occurrence.

One of the saddest duties we have been called upon to perform for many a day is the chronicling of the death of Hon. Samuel Henry, of Ebensburg, which occurred at the upper end of Woodvale, at 4:30 o'clock this morning.

There is little else known of his subsequent movements. The body was found lying between the north and south tracks of the railroad just a short distance west of the Woodvale crossing, at 5:15 this morning.

As soon as possible a pusher was sent down from East Conemaugh, and the remains were taken up to the depot at that place, when it was first discovered that the body was that of Hon. Samuel Henry.

One short blast of the whistle signifies apply the brakes. Two short blasts, release the brakes.

A succession of short blasts is a cattle alarm. A blast of five seconds duration is a signal for approaching stations.

It is also 70 barrels of salt, 70 of flour, 60 of whisky, 200 sack of flour, 6 cords of soft wood, 17 to 20 head of sheep, 50 head of hogs, 80 to 100 head of cattle, 9,000 feet of solid boards, 17,000 feet of siding, 13,000 feet of flooring, 40,000 shingles, one half load of lumber, one-fourth less of grain, one-tenth of joints, scum and all other large lumber, 340 bushels of wheat, 300 of corn, 680 of apples, 400 of Irish potatoes, 360 of sweet potatoes, 1,000 bushels of bran.
