The objects of the meeting were then stated by the chairman .-On motion a committee of four was appointed to numerate permanent officers, and a com mittee of five to draft and report a Constitu tion and By-Laws for the Association. The Committee on numerations consisted of Drs Shaffer of Mifflin, Geimmill of Blair, Orlady of Huntingdon and Brown of Juniata, which reputed for President Dr. Roan Clark; Vice Presidents, Dr. John B. Ross of Blair and Dr D. P. Miller of Huntingdon; Recording Sec. Dr. A. B. Brumbaugh; Corresponding Sec. Dr. A. Rothrock; Treasurer, Dr. Wm. Finley Dr. J. I. Marks of Mifflin : Dr. D. M. Crawfor of Juniata; Dr. O. H. Oris of Perry.

The report of the Committee was accepted and on motion confirmed. The Committee on rock, Harshberger, Miller and Banks which reported a constitution and By-Laws each article of which was read, discussed and adopted. The Society was named "The Juniata Valley Medical Association," to consist of the coun ties of Blair, Huntingdon, Bedford, Juniata, Mifflin and Perry, and is to hold its annual meetings in July of each year.
