This is much were it all, but it is growing rapidly worse. We ask those who have charge of affairs where the once boasted pride of the township now is, and where your personal pride and energy is? At the present rate of declining, we ask what will be our standard and the condition of our schools in five, ten or fifteen years from now?

In the long run, if it pays not to expend much money in educational interests, then let the directors close their "Temples of learning" and encourage ignorance and vice openly as they are now doing indirectly. ng indirectly.
As citizens who desire the good of the rising As citizens who desire the good of the rising generation it is high time we were coming to a knowledge of the drift of the educational sentiment of Porter township. And as directors, who have the entire control and responsibility, as men who are not behind the times, it becomes you to who are not bening the times, it becomes you to roll yourselves out of the way as stumbling blocks in the path of popular education, and let the township pattern after those around them whom it once professed to be an example worthy of imitation.


