WHO CAN VOTE.

Every male citizen, twenty-one years of age, a following qualifications, shall be entitled to 1. He shall have been a citizen of the United States

He shall have been a citizen of the United States one month.
 Ho shall have resided in the State one year; or, it having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen thereof, and shall have removed therefrom and returned, then he shall have resided therein six months immediately preceding the election.
 He shall have resided in the district where he intends to vote two months immediately preceding the election, instead of ten days, as formerly.
 If twenty-one years of age, or upward, he shall have paid, within two years, a State or county tax, which shall lave been assessed at least two months previous to the election, and paid at least one month previons to the same.
 Foreign born citizens must have been naturalized at east one month before the election, and must conform to be requirements contained in section 4, preceding.
