Destroying Weeds.

On looking back many years, we see the progress which has been made in the mode of attacking them, in successive generations. Half a century ago the common injunction was, to 'Pull up and remove carefully those which have gone to seed to prevent the seeding of next year's crop.'

To 'be careful not to scatter the seed' which has been already borne in abundance. This was regarded as good and careful management. But an improvement was made on this mode, namely, by not allowing the seed to ripen—their formation was to be prevented—an excellent idea it seemed to be: under this improved treatment weeds were destroyed when half a foot high, more or less. But observing cultivators were not satisfied.

They discovered that the labor of rooting out those full grown or half grown monsters was too great. They struck boldly, therefore, for the destruction of these intruders while they were only an inch high. The labor was decreased incredibly.

There was a great difference in the force required to crush a delicate little organization as large as a emerald needle, and one a foot high, with roots like strong bristles branching and penetrating the soil another foot, and lifting the plants of the crop when torn out. The improved mode lessened the labor ten, twenty, or thirty fold. The great point, then, was to take them in time, and it was found to be better to pay a man five dollars a day to destroy them in their feeble and delicate condition, than fifty cents a day when stout and shading the whole crop.

But still further improvement was made in this was to destroy the weeds before they came up, when they were just beginning to send out their minute white filices from the soil. In other words, the seed sate, fine harrow, or cultivator, is passed over the surface while it is yet clean, the process consists in simply mowing thoroughly the whole surface without waiting for any of them to make an ineffectual appearance.

Perennial-rooted weeds, as Canada thistle, the milk-weeds, quack grass, &c., which spread mostly by the roots, may be thoroughly eradicated in a single season, and at little expense, by plowing often enough to keep the leaves perpetually under.

For annual weeds, kill them in earliest infancy, while minute and fragile, and easily swept off by myriads; and for perennials, never let a solitary leaf appear above the surface, and the work will be speedily accomplished.—Country Gentleman.

Build up a Homestead.

The feeling that you are settled and fixed will induce you to work and improve your farms, to plant orchards, to set out shade trees, to inclose pastures, to build comfortable houses, and each successive improvement is a bond to bind you still closer to your homes. There must be both sunshine and shade, luscious fruit and fragrant flowers, as well as corn and cotton. Stick to, improve and beautify your homesteads, for with this good work comes contentment.

FALL SETTING OF RASPBERRIES.—Purdy's Fruit Recorder gives directions for management with red raspberries, and if they are followed and a good crop is not obtained is willing to bear all the blame that can be heaped on. First plant only hardy sorts as Bristol, Turner, Highland, Hanly, Brandy-wine and Philadelphia, second, set out in the fall four and one-half feet each way, cutting off six inches from the ground. Third, when planted hill up around them, and in early spring pass over the ground with a harrow, so as to level down weeds that are just starting.

Fourth, cultivate both ways during the season, keeping all weeds from the hill and the young growth nipped off at the end when it gets eighteen inches to two feet high. Twice or three times pass through with a cutting attachment to cultivate to cut off suckers, being careful not to cut too deep. If the soil is rather poor or light throw a handful of compost in each hill as the plants are set and each year a small quantity under each bush close to the plant. A plantation thus grown and cultivated each year will yield an abundance of berries for five or six years.

FARM RULES.—Have a written contract with laborers. Use the best implements on the farm and keep them always in good order and well protected from the weather. Feed stock regularly, and recollect that a fat horse eats less than a poor one, and does much better work. Early planting is the best nine times out of ten. Never lay what you can produce at home equally as cheap. Never plant more than you can cultivate well. Never borrow from a neighbor except in case of necessity, and then return whatever you borrow as soon as possible. Prepare your plow for market whatever you can spare from the farm and sell it when it is in the best state of preparation.
