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The magnitude of the Centennial never strikes one so forcibly as when he undertakes to follow one particular line of study; and in the selection of that particular line he will not fail to notice the vast importance of agriculture to the very existence of modern society.

Go through the departments of the various nations, and look up the wheat. Here are hundreds on hundreds of exhibitors, and they are gathered together from the utmost ends of the earth.

There are remnants of Indian races, Aztecs and of many nations passed away, or uncivilized people still existing. They glory or have gloried in tomahawks and spears, bows and arrows, skins and feathered ornaments; but the great glory of the progressive man is his wheat.

Bread is truly to him the staff of life. As to make any critical decision of the wheat on exhibition, it is certainly impossible; and the wisdom of the "American system" for the jurists, instead of the old system of awards, is now here more manifest than in the consideration of these wheat offerings.

Any set of judges who would undertake to award a premium for the best wheat offered here, should be sent to a mad house. A jury can say that such or such is meritorious, and point out in what its merits consist; but to select the best is simply impossible.

Here, for instance, we find some tolerable fine grain, large and handsome wheat; but it is in evidence that the largest grain does not always produce the greatest number of bushels per acre.

There are some heavy crops to be seen, but the flour is not equal to that of small- or average to the acre. Kansas and Oregon, for instance, do not profess to have near the yield per acre that Oregon does.

Thirty or thirty-five bushels to the acre satisfies them; but Colorado flour holds a high price in the best of markets. On the other hand there is Oregon. She shows us a bushel of "Mammoth White" from a lot said to have yielded forty-eight bushels to the acre.

Another, the Clawson seventy-five bushels to the acre. A bushel of eight is offered from a lot said to yield eighty-seven bushels to the acre. But it is the universal testimony that the month fruits of that region are inferior in quality to those of more moderately productive regions, and we suppose that will hold good of grain also.

There is one bushel marked "Mediterranean," which is said to be from a lot that yielded one hundred bushels to the acre! Even the Egyptian or seven-headed wheat which the Egyptian "Yankees" used to sell to the mouth-epicurean traveler as "veritable mummy wheat," and which no one in these modern times ever thought to grow for a crop, if ever the ancient Coptics did, is credited here with an average of seventy-five bushels to the acre.

On the other hand again, we have quality against quantity in the product of Minnesota. Here samples: 25, 27, 30, 34 and in some case 40 bushels to the acre. But who does not know the value of "Minnesota flour?" From the same State are out yielding seventy-five and eighty-two bushels per acre, and barley fifty-eight to sixty.

Wool on a Live Sheep. The Trade Journal is credited with the following suggestion for selecting a fine-wooled sheep: Always assuming the wool to be inspected is really a fine wool, we first examine the shoulders at the part where the finest and best wool is usually found.

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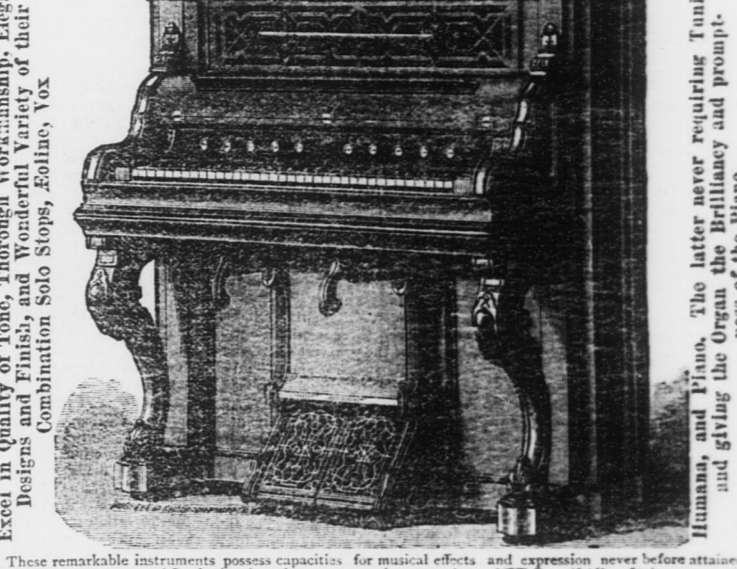
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
