How to get Rid of Household Pests. A correspondent of the Scientific Amer

I have not seen a bed bug or a flea in my house for many years. If an army of them were to be brought in mercury would speedily exterminate them; but I think cleanliness the best and perhaps the only preventive. The common house fly I do not molest, believing that it more than ompensates for its trouble by clearing the tmosphere of effluvia and the animalcules which always arise from the putrefaction of ecaving substances during warm weather.

So also with the birds, which are quite numerous during the summer. Instead of shooting them or setting up scarecrows to frighten them away, I throw out every possible inducement for them to build their nests in my fruit trees. The birds capture a large share of the insects in the larva state, and thus the millers are prevented from depositing eggs for future worms. As to the loss of fruit by the birds, the latter are always sure to be on hand in force in the season of ripe fruit, whether they come early to take the worms

For the residue of insects which infest my vegetable garden, I find that the lab. oratory of the chemist furnishes materials fatal to them all, among which the white hellebore and cayenne pepper are of the most utility. The bug or worm which cannot find vegetation unflavored with these articles will seek its breakfast elsewhere and leave a garden unmolested.


