All of the farmers were of the well-to-do" sort, and some of them, who have turned their attention to fruits and market gardening, have grown rich. The soil is loam, varying from sandy to clayey, and surface gently undulating, intersected with small streams and occasional wet meadows, in which deposits of peat or muck are stored, sufficient

to fertilize the whole upland surface, after it has been exhausted of its natural fertility. It is certainly one of the most extensive tracts, in an almost level position, and suitable condition for pleasant farm ing, that we know of this side of the Western prairies. We found some of the oldest farms apparently as profitably productive as when first cleared of forest

fifty or a hundred years ago. The geologist would soon discov er the cause of this continued fertility. The whole country is a marine deposit, and all through the soil we found evidences of calcareous substances, generally in the form of indurated calcareous marl, showing many distinct forms of ancient shells, of the tertiary formation; and this marly substance is scattered all through the soil, in a very comminuted form, and in the exact condition most easily assimilated by such plants as the farmer desires to cultivate.

From an article on this subject in the Scientific Farmer, we condense the following items: "I understand very well, as probably every man does who handles milk, that there is a wide difference in the composition of pure milk, especially in the matter of the percentage of butter. All milk is richer in September than in June, and it varies in this respect in different seasons in the same herd or cow. The cow that is fleshy gives milk richer in butter than the cow that is thin and poor. One that has reached her full maturity one that has reached her full maturity disease originates in bood and no gives better milk than she did before she is the grown who was the story of reached that age. A cow that is gaining flesh day by day gives a richer milk than a cow that is losing it gradually. Experience has taught me that a cow's milk very deficient in butter often fattens a finer calf than that of a first-class butter cow. A man cannot procure milk profita-bly for any purpose without feeding his cows liberally with good, sound, healthy

CLOVER .- The proper time for cutting clover varies with the season : but it cannot be far into June. The time is when a majority of the heads are in full blow and few withered. If cut then it will be secured in better condition than if cut carlier, and be much sweeter and less liable to get dusty than if a majority of the heads are dying off The best plan to cure clover seems to be a mooted question. A practice, now followed by some of the best farmers, is, if the weather be good to spread it or turn it over when a little wilt ed after the cutting and to get it secured as soon as it can be made in good order. There is no time to be lost in curing in cocks. Nor is there any risk from spontaneous combustion in the mow. Though when well secured, admitted to be excellent feed for sheep, young cattle and milk COME TO THE JOURNAL OFFICE cows, most farmers have a prejudice against its use for horses. We never saw any injury from the use of good clover hay, to horses, if fed in moderation. Many feed without stint and not unfrequently
