Shoeing Horses.

Owners of horses, through the repeated warnings and teachings of the Agricultural Press, appear to be taken in the idea, at last, that to shoe a horse properly is a professional acquirement quite beyond the present skill or capacity of the average country blacksmith, and that a thorough knowledge of the anotomy of the horse's foct is just as essential to the competent farrier, as a knowledge of human anatomy is to the skillful surgeon. This fact is apparent from the number of lame horses to be met with daily upon the roads, as a majority of these cases of lameness may be traced directly to improper treatment of their feet. We had an illustration to the point in one of "the talks around the old ten plate," from our correspondent Peter Plowplate," from our correspondent Peter Plow-

share. In this case our correspondent lost the use of an otherwise sound horse for a whole year, owing entirely to the ignorance of the blacksmith in the structure of the horse's foot; the horse was afterwards taken to another shop where the smith had made the anatomy of the horse's foot a special study, and the result was a perfect cure of the horse's lameness in thirty days, and no return since, after two years of constant driving Owners of horses, too, are in a measure responsible for the injudicious handling of their horse's feet by the farrier. Almost

every horse has some little peculiarity of hoofs, or may require special need or care in the manipulating of his feet by the farrier, that should be thoroughly understood by his owner. His hoofs may be brittle, or two soft, he may stumble, over-reach or interfere, all which should be explained to the farrier, as all those defects may be remedied by judicious shoeing. The shoes for a driving horse should be but hal? the weight of the slow moving farm or eart horse, and yet the average blacksmith makes no discrimination, but shoes all alike. The calculation is a remarkable one and shows what a waste of muscle, what a cruel drain upon a horse's strength, may be avoided by a proper attention. 
