All persons within the territory named will be called upon by their respective Physicians, and all in need of vaccination, in the opinion

of the Physician, are required to be vace Where persons are too poor to pay for the vaccination, it will be done at the expense of the borough, at the rate fixed upon by the Board of Health.

All persons employed to nurse or wait upo small-pox patients, as well as all members o the family afflicted with the disease, are hereby strictly prohibited from running at large upon the streets, until, in the judgment of the Physician attending, it would be safe for them to circular. do so.

The Chief of Police is hereby required t see that the above regulation is rigidly enforced, and to arrest all persons found vio lating the same.
