The engine is cut off at a sufficient distance from the coal wharf, and the train is allowed to run at such a rate of speed as will bring it to the engine about the time the necessary coal has been taken on. It was while withdrawlng a bolt to cut the train for this purpose yesterday that Pressler was hurt. By some means he fell to the ground, and after the first freight car passed over him he seized hold of the second one and was dragged some distance before the train was stopped. The unfortunate man was extricated, and it was found that his arm had been torn off near the shoulder-the stump being taken out at the shoulder joint afterward ; he had received a cut two and a half inches long on the top of his head : a gash over the eye' and had a hole knocked in hisupper jaw.
