When to Cut Clover.

The object in harvesting clover and

grass generally should be to cut it at that stage of growth when it contains the greatest amount of nutriment Much, of course will depend upon the weather, but much also depends on the exact stage of growth at which the plant is cut The end and aim, if we may so speak, of all the plantis to propagate their species. Hence we find them springing up, flourshing, producing seed, and then dying. During periods of active growth they are constantly engaged in receiving extraneous nutritive matter with which the structure of the plant is composed, is constantly undergoing change—the sugar that abounds in the young and growing plant being largely changed during the ripening of the seed into husk, bran and starch in the grain, or woody fiber in the stalk. The opening of the flower is the signal for the commencement of this change, which continues to go on until the plant has reach ed maturity-consequently the longer this change is permitted to continue the more this matter will decrease. 




