Beginning at a point on the lines between the townships of Porter and Morris, on the top of the Short mountain near the Pennsylvania Railroad tunnel, and running thence to a point on the public road from Water Street to Arch Springs, where said road is inter-sected by the road leading to Union Furnace, and thence same direction to intersect the line between the counties of Huntingdon and Blair, thence along said line to the line between the townships of Franklin and Warriorsmark, thence along said line to a point where said line is intersected by the public road leading from Spruce Creek to Birningham, thence by a line running to a point on the top of Tussey's mountain on the line between the intersection of the townships of Bestmend Lorgen there a long the line between at or near the intersection of the townships of Porter and Logan, thence along the line between

ELECTION OFFICERS.

No person shall be qualified to serve as an ele No person shall be quantized to serve as an elec-tion officer who shall hold, or shall within two months have held any office, appointment or em-ployment in or under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of a y eity or county, or of any municipal board, commission or termine our sity area only unside of the Peace

county, or of any municipal board, commission or trust in any city, save only Justices of the Peace and Aldermer, Notaries Public appersons in the militia service of the State; nor shall any election officer be eligible to any civil office to be filled at an election at which he shall serve, save only to such subordinate municipal or local offices below the grade of city or county offices, as shall be des-ignated by general laws. Constitution, Article S, Section 15.

MODE OF VOTING REGULATED. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Rep

resentatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylva-nia in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth at all general, township, borough and special elections are hereby hereafter author-ized and exercised to vote by tichets printed er ized and required to vote by tichets printed of bied and required to vote by thetes printed of written, or partly printed and partly written, sev-erally classified as follows: One ticket shall em-brace the names of all judges of courts voted for and be labelled "Judiciary"; one ticket shall em-brace the names of all State officers voted for, and belabelled "Judiciary"; one ticket shall em-brace the names of all State officers voted for, and brace the names of all state oncers voted for, and be labelled "State"; one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of Senator and members of Assembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for, and be labelled "County"; one ticket shall em-brace the names of all township officers voted for, and be labelled "Correship" one ticket shall em-
