



When the office boy called him this morning there was no re sponse, and when the attendants got in through the transom they found him dead it

through the transom they found him dead in bed. The body was not yet cold, he having been dead about three hours. From a partial examination Dr. M'Vicker, who was immedi-ately called, is of the opinion that death was the result of sudden congestion of the lungs, brought about by a cold which was contracted at Janesville.
