fry it. There is no mystery ab ut broil ing a beefsteak. The simple art is to cook a steak without smoking, and to re tain the juices What is needed is simply to broil with ot firing or blozing. No steak can be cooked without watching it. must be well cooked in order to keep the juice inside; but the outside must have scarce any thickness. The thing to do is to turn a steak from side to side, and to keep doing it. Never pepper or salt steak until it is on the dish To pepper it might not do so much harm, but to salt it is almost a crime Good steaks must be served instantaneously on a hot plate. Butter is admissible on a steak, but on y in a very minute quantity. Cut an inch and an eighth thick, and the cooking

Soak the clothes first in clear which the soap and mixture have been stirred in cold water, boil ten minutes. then take out, wash the dirty places, and rinse in plenty of clean water.
