Proposed Amendment to the Constitution.

Resolution Relative to the Amendment of the State Constitution.

Resolved, That the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly met, That the Constitution of this Commonwealth be amended in the third section of the second article, so that it shall read as follows: "The Governor shall hold office during three years, from the third Tuesday of January, next ensuing his election, and shall not be capable of holding it longer than a SINGLE TERM OF THREE YEARS, in any term of nine years."

At a Stated Orphan's Court,

Held at Carlisle on Tuesday the 11th of May 1841, in and for Cumberland county, the following proceedings were had to wit:

Upon the petition of George Harlan, administrator of Stephen Harlan, dec'd., representing that John McCollum late of Southampton township, in said county dec'd., seized in fee simple of a tract of land situate in said township, leaving issue nine children, after whose death, William and Archibald McCollum, two of his sons, conveyed their interest in said land, (it being two undivided ninths,) to Barnabas Thrush after wards, to wit: on the 9th May 1830, and that Thrush mortgaged the land to Robert McBride and the said McCollum's, and that George Harlan, administrator of the said Robert McBride and Hugh Greenfield, administrators of Jno. McCollum dec'd., to secure the payment of \$200 to be paid in three equal annual payments, commencing on the 11th April 1830, which mortgage was assigned by the said George Harlan, to the said Stephen Harlan, dec'd., the 9th May 1836.

The real estate of the aforesaid John McCollum, dec'd., after said mortgage was given, was sold and appraised on a writ of partition and distribution issued out of the Orphan's Court of Cumberland county, and on the 11th of September 1839, confirmed to George Hoch, assignee of some of the heirs aforesaid John McCollum, dec'd., and the Court directed the said George Hoch to enter into recognizance for the payment of the shares of the aforesaid William & Archibald McCollum, upon which the aforesaid mortgage was a lien, into the Orphan's Court of said county, agreeably to the provisions of the act of Assembly. And the said George Hoch, in pursuance and discharge of his said recognizance, did pay to the Orphan's Court on the 14th April 1840, \$425 & 62, making in all \$651 14, which sum, said petitioner alleges he is entitled to receive in payment and discharge of the aforesaid mortgage so as aforesaid assigned to Stephen Harlan, and prayed the court to order and decree the payment of the same to the said petitioner as administrator of the said Stephen Harlan, dec'd.

Thereupon the Court, on the 11th May 1841, did grant a rule on the parties interested to appear at an Orphan's Court to be held at Carlisle, on Tuesday the 31st day of August next to show cause why the sum of \$651 14 deposited in the Carlisle Bank in the credit of the Orphan's Court of Cumberland county, should not be paid to George Harlan, administrator of Stephen Harlan, dec'd.

It is therefore hereby given by me, in pursuance of the aforesaid Rule of Court, to all persons interested to appear at the time & place above mentioned, and show cause, if any they have, why the aforesaid sum of \$651 14 should not be paid to the aforesaid George Harlan, administrator of Stephen Harlan, dec'd., agreeably to the prayer of the aforesaid petitioner.
