Table showing the number of paupers in the Institution 1st January 1848, of which 24 were colored. Number admitted up to 31st December, 1848, of which 33 were colored. Making the whole number through the year, 241. Of which 24 died, 3 children bound out, 23 eloped, and 176 discharged.

Whole number supported 1st January, 1849. Of those remaining in the Poor House 31st December, 1848, there are—Males 74 of which 14 are colored. Females 43, of which 19 are colored. And 9 outdoor paupers, of which 1 is colored.

Average number per day through the year. There are as near as can be ascertained under 1 year; 3 from 1 to 5; 19 from 5 to 10; 8 from 10 to 20; 7 from 20 to 30; 10 from 30 to 40; 19 from 40 to 50; 9 from 50 to 60; 33 from 60 to 70; 19 from 70 to 80; 6 from 80 to 90; 1 from 90 to 100; 1 above 100.
