

Foreign News—One Week Later. The Steamship *Hibernia* arrived at Halifax on Wednesday, with Liverpool dates to May 4th. She brings important commercial intelligence. Cotton had again advanced to 10d per lb. The week's sales were 71,000 bales, of which speculators took 38,000. Flour had advanced one shilling, and was firm. Indian Corn is in demand at about 6d advance.

American securities continue in good demand.—U. S. 5's are quoted at 110 1/2 to 111. Business in the manufacturing district continues favorable. The *Esplanade*—Beyond the fact that the Ministry have again left in a minority on a point of little moment, the proceedings of Parliament possess general interest.

Her Majesty, the Queen, was safely delivered of another prince on Wednesday, May 1st. A May-flower for the royal brood. FRANCE.—The elections in Paris, which took place on Sunday, April 28th, passed off without disturbance. Eugene Sue received the votes of full one-half the army at Paris, and beat his opponent by 8,000 votes. The Socialists are greatly elated with the result.

Greece.—The Greek difficulty is neither settled nor likely to be. All is quiet on the continent.

THE NEXT U. S. SENATOR.—The *Narrator* registers, expresses a decided preference for the Hon. JEREMIAH S. BLACK of Somerset, as the successor of Mr. STOROKER, in the United States Senate.

J. H. Allen murdered his own daughter, two years old, and then hung himself at Nassau, Mass., on the 14th instant, while in a state of intoxication.

There were about 100 lives lost by the explosion on board the steamer *Anthony* near New York. The number saved at first was only 40.

THE PHILADELPHIA MARKET. Monday evening, May 20. The Flour market continues quiet; standard brands are held firmly at 85 1/2 per bushel, but there is little inquiry for export, and the market is limited. For city consumption sales of common and good brands at 85 1/2 to 85 3/4, and choice lots of extra at 85 3/4 to 85 3/4. Rye Flour—A small lot at 82 1/2. Corn Meal is held firmly at the same price. There is an increased demand for white wheat, and 4,000 bu. sold at \$1.30. Rye, 4 & 500 bushels Penn's sold at 60c per bushel. 6,000 bu. of yellow Corn sold at Saturday at 60c. Today holders demand the same price, but 2 & 3,000 bu. have been taken for shipment at a price to be fixed. Oats are scarce, we quote Penn's at 40 & 41c per bu. Whiskey—Sales in hides at 22 1/2 c, and bris at 23c.

Notice to Tax-Payers. UNDER the provisions of the act of 1844, any county paying into the State Treasury the State Tax to be paid on such county, prior to the 15th day of any year, is entitled to an abatement of 5 per cent. on the amount so paid. The undersigned, Commissioners of Cumberland county, in view of the above provisions, consider it equitable and proper that those who, by the prompt payment of their taxes prior to the above date, enable the Treasurer to pay, and the State to receive, the amount of 5 per cent. on the amount of both State and county tax, in all cases where the State and county tax is paid to the collector before the 15th day of July, 1850, when said abatement amount to one cent or more, no fraction of a cent to be credited.

Since the act of 1844, the Commissioners have paid the State tax of this county annually to the State Treasurer, within the time prescribed by the act, and the county has received the benefit of an abatement of 5 per cent. thereon; but to meet said payment they have found it necessary heretofore to appropriate a portion of the county funds to meet the deficiency occasioned by delinquencies, until the balance of the State tax was collected. It therefore becomes necessary to require the payment of both State and county tax to be paid to the collector before the 15th day of July.

This undersigned, therefore, confidently anticipate that the above arrangement, and the further inducement of enabling the County to receive the benefit of the character for promptness and fidelity which she has acquired in the discharge of her obligations to the Commonwealth, will induce every citizen to discharge their State and county tax prior to the 15th day of July.
