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Notice to Bridge Builders.
THE Commissioners of Cumberland county, will receive proposals at their office, in Carlisle, until Monday, the 20th day of June, 1853, for the building of a
Stone Bridge,
across the Yellow Broches creek, at a point fixed by viewers below Ege's mill, by their variation from the public road leading from Bricker's mill to Carlisle. The bridge to be of the following dimensions, viz: To contain in length 124 feet from one abutment to the other, the abutments to be built upon a solid foundation which are to be approved by the Commissioners. The height of the abutments to be two feet above low water mark, at which point the heel of the arches start. The bridge to be three arches, the center arch will be 40 feet span and 12 foot rise, the two outer arches to be of 34 feet span and 10 foot rise each. There will be two piers in the creek 8 feet thick and 25 feet long each. The piers to be carried up 5 feet, at which height the cut water is to commence battering and losses in the wall at 11 feet. The buttments to be 10 feet thick—the wing walls adjoining the abutments to be not less than 5 feet thick and 3 feet thick at the extreme ends, and to finish 2 feet thick at the grade and to be carried up 3 feet above the grade when finished with a 20 inch wall from grade, properly coped as hereinafter described. The extension of the wing wall on the south end of the bridge to be 20 feet from the abutment, and the extension on the north end of the bridge to be 12 feet from the abutment, the grade of the bridge not to exceed 3 degrees from the center of the center arch until it strikes the road on either side. The breadth of the bridge to be 18 feet between the parapet walls in the clear. The entire work to be built of good limestone and mortar, the mortar to be made of good sharp sand and lime of the following proportions: Six bushels of lime to one cart load of sand, the arches to be built of good flat stone well bound all through the arch, the joints well caulked and to be two feet thick in depth, three courses to break band and to be closely cut and laid and not to be less than six inches thick. The parapet walls to rise 3 feet above the grade the entire length of the bridge when finished, the walls to be coped with stone coping, not less than 2 feet long and 4 inches thick, to be closely jointed, joints not to exceed half an inch; the coping to project over the walls on both sides.
If the Commissioners should determine to discontinue with the stone coping, the following will be adopted:
The walls shall be roofed with the best river shingles, to be put on 6 inches to the weather, the rafters to be of such size as the Commissioners may determine, not exceeding 6 inches; the rafters to be built in the wall 3 feet apart, morticed or dovetailed down on a string, and to be two feet side to show 6 inches on the outside 6 inches, and to be of good white pine, and to be finished with three good coats of oil paint in lead. All of the foregoing work is to be done in a substantial and workmanlike manner, and its durability insured for a period of three years from its completion. Work to be entirely finished by the 1st day of October, A. D. 1853.
