

The Week of the Staffed-for-The Crew Saved, but None of the Passengers.
Boston, January 7.—The following is an extract from a letter received here by the Canada, dated Halifax, Jan. 4th:
The schooner Expert landed eleven of the crew of the Staffed-for-The Crew and three at Halifax. Captain Richardson was seriously injured the day before the wreck, and was in bed at the time.
The mate, when leaving the vessel, held a pistol in his hand, and presented the passengers from getting into the boat. (This is doubted.)
One boat was capable of holding one hundred persons, in which only a few of the crew escaped. None of the passengers were saved.
A telegraphic despatch from Burlington, N. S., says, that three boats of the Staffed-for-The Crew, with twenty-nine men and one woman, landed from the ship. The schooner Expert picked up fourteen men, whom she landed at Shelburne, making a total in all of forty-four saved.
Iowa.—The emigration into Iowa, the present season, is astonishing and unprecedented. For miles, and miles, day after day, the prairies of Illinois are lined with carriages and wagons, pushing on towards the prosperous State. At a point beyond Peoria, during a single month, seventeen hundred and forty-three wagons had passed and all for Iowa. Allowing five persons to a wagon, which is a fair average, would give 8,715 souls to the population.
