Secret 1. Resolved by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennyleants, in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be and the same are hereby proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth undersand in accordance with the provisions of the touth article thereof, to wit: PROPOSITION 1, TO BE ABTICLE MI.

Enorosition I, to BE ARTICLE II.

SECTION I. The aggregate amount of debts hereafter contracted by the Commonwealth shall never exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except in ease of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to redeem the public debt of the Commonwealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to the purpose for which the debt may be contracted, or pay such debts, and to no other purpose.

SECT. 2. To pay the public debt of the Commonwealth, and debts which may hereafter be contracted in ease of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection and to redeem the public debt, the Legislature shall at their next session after the adoption of this section into the Constitution, provide by lawfor the creation of a sinking fund, which shall not be abolished till the said public debt be wholly paid, to consist of all the net annual income from the public works and stocks owned by the Commonwealth, or any other funds arising the converse and stocks. nual income from the public works and stocks owned by the Commonwealth, or any other funds arising under any revenue law now existing or that may be hereafter enacted, so far as the same may be required to pay the interest of said debts semi-annually, and annually to reduce the principle thereof by a sum not less than fire hundred thousand dollars, increased yearly by compounding at a rate of not less than five per centum per annum; the said shiking fund be invested in the loans of the Commonwealth, which shall be cancelled from time to time in a manner to he provided by law: no portion of the sinking fund shall ever be applied to the payment of the debt of five hundred thousand dollars mentioned in the first section of this article, but the said sinking fund shall be applied only to the purposes herein specified.
