SECTION 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, That hereafter it shall be the duty of each and every owner and occupier of property within this Borough, whether corporations or individuals, to remove all snow or slush that may fall on the pavements or sidewalks in front of or along any lot or property in the inhabited part of the tow limits where persons are accustomed to pass and repass on foot, within twelve daylight hours after the same shall flave fallen: And all such owners and occupiers shall be liable to a penalty of Five Dollars for every neglect of the requirements of this Ordinance, to be collected as other penalties are collected.

Sre. 2. It shall be the duty of the High Constable after every fail of snow or slush that may incommed the wriking or render it disagreeable, and after the owners and occupiers of preceptly have land a reasonable time to remove said snow or slush from the pavements and sidewalks in front of their properties, to go around the different streets of the Borough, to the end of each aireet as far as it is inhabited, and whenever the snow or slush shall not have been sufficiently removed, from the pavements or sidewalks, he shall notify the owner or occupier of the property in front of which the said snow or slush to not immediately removed, after such notice was been given; and in the pavement of the property in front of which the said snow or slush be not immediately removed, after such notice given, it shall be the duty of the High Constable for giving such notice shall be entitled to demand and suc for the sum of Twenty-five cents, to be paid by the person to whom said notice as been given; and the said snow or slush. 
