The Board of Trustees, composed of one Director from each school district in Cumberland county, have established the school with the design that teachers may be properly trained and qualified in the different branches, necessary for a proper prosecution of their professional duties; and, to furnish as far as possible, a model of a well organized and efficiently conducted school, to all others who may desire to attend, and prepare themselves for other positions in life.

The annexed list of studies is arranged in departments, without regard to the order in which the various branches will be pursued, or to the length of thee which have be devoted to them.
