HEAVY LOSS OF PROPERTY! Last night at a quarter before 10 o'clock,our citizens were startled by the cry of "fire!?"
not that uncertain, lialf-reluctant cry which carries with it the conviction that it is a false alarm ment made by the fire companies, a bright, spread to neighboring buildings, we have scarce seen equalled. Toward the scene there poured a continuous stream of people, of both sexes. own and small, and the gleam which the gree-flames sent abroad, illuminated the whole neighborhood, presenting such a night picture as is never seen but on the occasion of some

The fire originated in a small frame stable, be longing to M'Gowan's Hotel, on the corner of the settlement of their accounts. Second and Chesnut streets; and with such rapidity did the flames spread, that three adjoining buildings, belonging to Messrs. Jause and Myers, were enveloped before the firemen could bring their streams to play upon them. From these, several frame buildings in the rear took fire, and soon after the flames communi cated to the Presbyterian Church, on Second street. This edifice could have been saved, had the fire apparatus been of the proper efficiency as the cornice only of one end first took fire but the hose of the Citizen burst, and a stream could not reach that height. Here, as well as in the frame buildings back of it, the destruc tion was rapid—the roof and cupalo being soon enveloped in a sheet of flame; and as the creeping fire mounted to the top of the cupalo thrillingly grand sight was presented, yet an palling to many a heart who witnessed it.

Both on Second and Chesnut, in the alleys adjoining, and Mulbury street below, there was rdinarily busy scene, in the efforts t seave the property endangered; and most gal-lantly and nobly did the firemen, and citizens generally, lend the mseives to the task. At one time it was feared that the whole range o frame buildings in the rear of the church, be nween Chesnut and Mulberry, and between Sec ond and Third, would share the fate of those in which the first originated. It is impossible to estimate the amount or property destroyed and injured by removing it from the dwellings endangered. Positive losses we have been able to gleam with some precision.

The stable in which the fire originated was

worth but very little—being just such an old affair as would tempt an incendiary. Mr. Samuel Myers, at the corner of the alley at a shoe store, with a stock worth \$2,000. Building and articles partly destroyed. He had an insurance of \$400.

Mr. Ludwig Welz, Baker, lost some fifteen barrels of flour, meat, furriture, etc., altogether some \$500. No insurance. The building belonged to the Bridge Company, having been sold some two weeks ago by Mr. C. Ebberley There was an insurance upon it of \$1000, nearly Mr. John Jauss, house and furniture destroy-

ed and broken. The loss is about \$2,000. In sured for \$1,000. Mr. Fetter, a tenant of Mr. Jauss, lost every thing in his house, valued at some \$200.

Mrs. Fox, widow of Sheriff Fox, occupied a small house in the yard of Mr. Jauss son and she reside together, and had already retired. They were rescued with some difficul

ty, although the house, being built of brick, withstood the devouring element. Mr. Lucas Koenig, Brewer, whose whole premises were in imminent peril, is indebted to the untiring efforts of the firemen for its safety. His loss is slight—some say \$200, which is tully convered by inconvence. covered by insurance.

The Presbyterian Church, which was totally destroyed, was insured in the Pennsylvania and Armstroi Frankin Insurance Co., at Philadelphiat for Bell Sam \$7,000. The Library was saved, together with two melodeans, and nearly all the cushions and furniture.

The fire was the work of an incendiary, and certain suspicious circumstances occurred which will be zealously investigated. An attempt was made on last Friday marning to fire the some building; and it is to be hoped that the miscreant or miscreants may be traced to their functed security, and that condign punishment meted out to them which their dastardly act de-

INCIDENTS OF THE PIRE. Whilst the firemen were hard at work, some fiends in human shape, were fusy conting the hose of the firemen, and they were frequently interrupted by the stoppinge of water, whilst they thought their hose had bursted, but on examining the lose of the Hope company this forenoon, it was discovered that it had been cut eleven times with some instrument, probably a razor. Burning alive would not have been too

severe a punishment for such men.

While the flames were at their height, a large Geese Wm number of pigeons, disturbed from their rest, flew bewildered above the lurid scene, fluttering, failing, and at last tell into the burning pile, victims to their own unconscious temerity.

Mr. Weaver, occupying one of the buildings in danger, was confined to bed by sickness; and, in attempting to leave, was so weak that he fell, and had to be assisted to sate quarters. A lady named Mrs. Bosh was also confined by severe illness, and lay in bed in close prox-

imity to the flames, every moment subject to the destruction which reigned around. She vould have been removed when the necessity became urgent.

In the rear of the busy scene, and in constant danger of the buildings, lay the corpse of a child—the sadness of whose household presented a sombre contrast to the scene without.
In a portion of the square destroyed, a dog, which was chained in one of the stables, was

burned to a crisp; also a hog, which was in the

premises adjoining.
Quite an excitement was occasioned in the one can excitement was occasioned in the residual portion of the walls fell, and a fearful auxiety manifested for the fate of several in its immediate vicinity.

As they fell on the outside, several persons postage. jumped into the cellar, thus escaping certain de-

Several persons, during the fire, were slightly injured, among them Mr. Agustus Sayford.

Two young men were arrested, this morning about 3 o'clock, as resembling two persons who were seen running from the neighborhood of the fire upon the sounding of the alarm. They were discharged, however, as their tickets proved them to have been passengers on the morning train from Baltimore.
