death in the House of Representatives. Those who voted to disregard his dying wish may well fortify themselves behind that sense of propriety which governed his own actions in the case of Mr. Adams. It was asking too much of the United States Senate-where he had sat for thirty consecutive years, (almost half his life-time,) and to which body he had added glory and renown by his ability and eloquence—to request that his demise should be passed over in silence. That body would be too strongly impressed by the melancholy event to admit of such a procedure. His remains were taken to St. Louis for interment, in accordance with his wish, expressed some years ago, in an affecting allusion, in a public speech, to his wife and children, who are buried in a cemetery at that place, in the State which so long honored him with her confidence, and which he made renow-ned in the national councils. Of our statesmen of the older class, for whom we confess a grea admiration, Mr. Buchanan and Lewis Cass are the sole survivors that participate in public life. May they long be kept back from joining the constellation of talent and worth which has pre-ceded them to the shores of the durk and un-

ceded them to the shores of the dark and un-iknown octan of eternity. Mr. Buchanan, though verging upon seventy years of age, possesses a physical and mental constitution that is extraordinary, and which, we fear, will hardly be imitated by many of the ge-neration which is growing up in what some call these "degenerate days." He is a gloriously hale and hearty old man, whose strength is am-ply adequate to the discharge of the onerous and laborious duffies imposed upon the chief Executive officer of this country. Few men at Executive officer of this country. Few men a fifty are physically in a better condition, and it in a fine illustration of what temperate habits and an exemplary life will accomplish, to see the two highest offices of the greatest nation in the world confided to men, one considerably over and the other barely under three score and ten, and to see them discharged with an ability that was scarcely ever surpassed. That generation which produced such men as Lewis Cass, James anan and Thomas H. 
