In making good butter there are several pice operations to be gone through with, which sequire an eye to cleanliness, forethought and ex-

1. On milking clean, fast, yet gently, reglarly twice a day, depends the success of the dairyman. Bad milkers should not be tolerated in a herd; better pay double the price for

good ones.

2. Straining is quite simple but it should be borne in mind that two pans about half full each will produce a greater amount of cream than the same milk if in but one pan; the reason of this is the greater surface.

3. Scalding is quite an important feature in the way of making butter in cool weather; the cream rises much quicker, milk keeps sweet longer, the butter is of a better color, and

packing, and when the butter has dissolved the salt, that the brine may be worked out. 10. Packing is done with the hands or with a butter mall, and when butter is put into wooden vessels, they should be soaked two or three days in strong brine before using. After each packing, cover the butter with a wet cloth, and put a layer of salt upon it; in this way the salt can easily be removed at any time, by simply taking hold of the edges of the cloth. Butter made in this way will keep any length of time required.
