Saw off your stock and put in your scion with two buds, wedge fashion, as in the cleft grafting of fluid trees, and then cover up a few inches, leaving one or two buds above ground; where the stock is very large and inconvenient to split, a gimlet hole, so made as to bring the two barks together, answers.
