FROM NEAR YORKTOWN.

NEAR YORKTOWN, April 9. The weather still continues unfavorable for military operations. It has been raining for two days. The creeks are much swolen, and the low ground covered with water, making the road almost impassable for empty wag-

Information received shows that the Rebels have a force of sixty thousand, which is rapidly being ald d to by troops from the neighborhood of Richmond, which is one day from Yorktown by railroad and river. They have four steamers and sixteen transports i use, and, by the time the roads are in condition for the Union army to move, the Rebels may be able to meet them with one hundred thousand men-the flower of their army, with their best arms. Besides, they are in a strongly entrenched position.

Previous to our troops occupying their pres ent position, the military authorities had no means of ascertaing the extent of the Rebel works. Information obtained through deserters, contrabands and other sources, show that the enemy have nearly five hundred guns, some of them of the largest calibre. The Rebel General, Johnson, with some his forces, has arrived and taken command in person, showing that they intend making a desperate resistance to the advance of our

troops at every point. The cheering news from the Western Department arrived here to-day, and our troops are wild with enthusiasm over the result, and are anxious to be led to action, that they may perform similar deeds of valor.
