From General Halleck's Army Advance of Gen. Sherman's Division. Important and Highly Successful Reconnaissance under Gen. Smith.

3,000 REBELS PUT TO FLIGHT. CAPTURE OF A LARGE AMOUNT OF ARTILLERY AND CAMP EQUIPAGE. GENERAL MITCHELL AT TUSCUMBIA, ALABAMA.

HE HOLDS 800 MILES OF RAILROAD TRACK HALLECK LARGELY RE-ENFORCED. GENERAL HALLECK IN COMMAND.

THE REBEL LINES AT CORINTH. WASHINGTON, Thursday, April 24, 1862. An officer from Corinth, according to the Associated Confederacy, reports that the Confederate lines extended over the recent battlefield, and that the Union's are being repulsed.

PITTSBURG LANDING, April 24, 1862. A reconnoitering party, under Gen. A. G. Smith, left this morning and attacked the enemy's pickets, 150 strong who left in great haste, leaving knapsacks, blankets, and everything else.

THE ADVANCE TO FREDERICKSBURG—OUR TROOPS IN FULL OCCUPATION. WASHINGTON, April 20. The design of General McDowell to advance upon Fredericksburg was probably known to more than half a dozen persons in Washington, and they steadily changed their views on the probability of the success of that plan.

HEAD-QUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, CAMP WINDFORD, APRIL 26, 11 A.M. To the Hon. EDWIN M. STANTON, Secretary of War: Early this morning an advance detachment of the Rebels on this side of the Warwick, near its head, was carried by assault by Company H, First Massachusetts Regiment. The work had a ditch six feet deep, with a strong parapet and was manned by two companies of I Corps, but not at all heavy.

LATER FROM HALLECK'S ARMY. Arrival of Rebel Deserters—The Evacuation of Corinth Confirmed—Burgess Going to Memphis. CHICAGO, April 27.—A special despatch from Cairo, to the Times, says that passing through the Rebels in the morning, on Thursday, thirty deserters from the Rebel army entered our camp and begged to be enrolled among our troops.
