THE ADVANCE TO FREDERICKBURG-OUR TROOPS IN FULL OCCUPATION. WASHINGTON, April 20.

The design of General McDowell to advance upon Frederickburg was probably known to more than half a dozen of persons in Washington, and they strictly kept the secret. The occupation of the suburbs of that town was the first news concerning it. Our troops are now in full occupation. The little town of Falmouth, on the north bank of the Rappahannoc, immediately opposite Frederickburg. was found almost deserted. Several Union families re, ained to welcome the advance of our troops. The people generally received our soldiers in a friendly manner, and expressed surprise when assured that they were to be protected instead of murdered, as they had been assured by the rebels they would he.

would he. Our decupation of the place was a surprise. The mills were still running, and women and children engaged in ordinary domestic avocation, when our cannon helched forth its thunder from the adjacent cliff.
