A STRINGENT WAR POLICY.

Washington, July 11, 1862. Military and political leaders are now satisfied that the loyal people expect that the war against the rebellion shall be prosecuted with more regard to the lives of our soldiers and less for the property of the traitors than heretofore. Whatever may be the differences on other questions, on this there is an evi dent unanimity. Every citizen, who pre tends to be for the Union, demands that the policy of protecting the possession of rebels should be at once and utterly abandoned. The idea of paying for what is necessary to support the army to the enemies of the counry has been productive of incalculable mischief. In many instances our troops, while suffering for subsistence, have been restraind from taking advantage of the property of the rebels, lest they might give offence to the so-called Union sentiment, and still further excite the traitors. This moderation has been productive of nothing but evil. The
