THE CONFISCATION BILL PASSED.

In the House of Representatives at Washington, on Friday week, the Committee of Conference on the Confiscation bill recommended that the House recede from their disagreement, and agree to the Senate with cer-

tain modifications so as to provide as follows: Every person who shall commit the crime of treason against the United States and shall be adjudged guilty thereof, shall suffer death, and all his slaves, if he has any, shall be declared and made free; or he shall be impris oned for not less than five years, and fined not less than \$10,000, and all his estate, real and personal, excluding slaves, shall be lev ied upon, and sale or conveyance to the con-trary notwithstanding. If any person shall hereafter incite, set on foot, assist or engage in any rebellion or insurrection against the nuthority of the United States, or the laws thereof, or shall give aid or comfort to any such existing rebellion or insurrection, and be convicted thereof, such person shall be punished by the forfeiture of all his personal property, of every kind whatever; or shall be punished by imprisonment ten years, and fined not exceeding ten thousand dollars, and his slaves, if he has any, be liberated at the discretion of the court, and all such property, excluding slaves, shall be forfeited to the United States. Every person guilty of either of the offences described in this act shall be forever incapable and disqualified to hold any office under the United States. This act is not to be constructed in any way to affect of alter the prosecution, conviction or punishment of any person guilty of treason against the United States. To insure the speedy termination of the present rebellion the Presi-dent is authorized to cause the seizure of all property, real and personal, of all such persons, and apply and use the proceeds of the same for the support of the United States.— Five classes of persons are affected by this bill—those who shall hereafter hold the office of president, vice president, member of Congress, foreign minister, &c., under the so called Confederate States. The President is authorized to issue a proclamation if, after sixty days, all persons in rebellion do not return to their allegiance, that their property shall be forfeited, &c. All slaves of persons hereafter engaged in rebellion, or who shall in any way give aid and comfort thereto, escaping to, and taking refuge within the lines of our army, and all slaves deserted by their masters, and coming under control of the government of the United States, and all slaves found at places conviced the possible forms. found at places occupied by rebel forces and afterwards by United States troops, shall be held to be captives of war, and be forever free from their service and no longer held as


