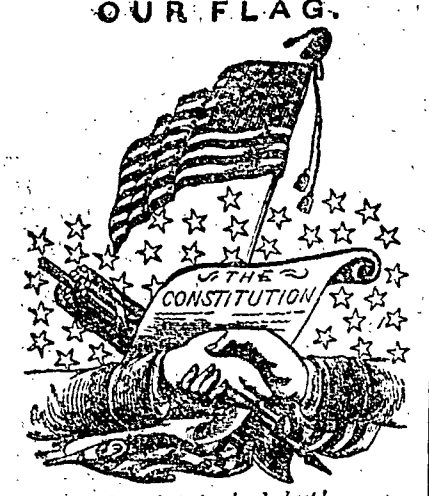

THE RESULT IN THIS COUNTY.

Approved Democratic Majority. In another column will be found the official returns for this county. It will be seen that we elect our entire County Ticket by an average majority of 8501. This is a glorious old-fashioned Democratic majority. Had it not been for the fact that about three to one of the voters in the army from this county are Democrats, our majority would have reached 1500. No doubt of this, whatever. In pointing to this glorious result, we are glad to be able to say that scores of men who voted for LINCOLN and CANTON, but who are not Abolitionists, contributed to our success. WHAT IS THE MEANING OF THIS?

The Washington letter writer of the Public Ledger, in his letter of the 16th of October, published in the Ledger of the 17th, says: "It is unfortunate that so many of our troops recently arrived here are not so well suited for the service to which they have been called. It is perhaps known that these troops are subject to a careful examination to their physical abilities, and the result of this late has been, that on an average not 20 in a hundred have been retained for duty. They are accordingly returned to the States, being, I presume, their bounties there, in their pockets when they started. This must have been some stoppage of some kind, where, or of some recruits would never have passed muster in the respective States from whence they came."

The above is a most striking announcement. What does the Administration mean by such conduct? If we dare be permitted to ask such a thing of the Supreme and Sovereign "powers that be." The order was issued to return every man as subject to draft, who had health and physical ability enough to stand the service for thirty days. The examining physician was directed to exempt no man who could perform the duties for thirty days. And yet the Administration, it appears, is rejecting 80 out of every 100 of some of our volunteer regiments to which large bounties have been paid out of the pockets of the people! Really this strikes us as being the most inexcusable and cruel trifling with our people, that we ever heard of.

A few months ago 300,000 volunteers were called for, and every argument and appeal were made use of to induce the participation of the people, and to encourage every one who could enter the military service. Thousands and thousands of dollars were raised and paid out, and thousands of volunteers enrolled, examined, and sworn into the service. Now it appears they are being rejected on their own pretences, and for slight bodily infirmities, and thousands of our farmers have to sell off their stock to go to the army and thousands of our day laborers are dragged from their homes and dependent families to fill up the draft.

What is the meaning of such conduct? If it be really true, our farmers and laborers may look out for another draft. Thank God, the Democracy are again gaining the ascendancy, and they will correct such evil.

As the Legislators of Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Indiana will be Democratic on joint ballot, it is believed by many that FRANK HUGHES, of Pennsylvania, VALLANTRAP, of Ohio, and BARRON, of Indiana, will be elected to the U. S. Senate by their respective States. How will that suit the Abolitionists?
