**AN ORDINANCE  
RELATING TO STRAY CATTLE.**  
Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by  
the Town Council of the Borough of Carlisle,  
and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the  
authority of the same, That the running at  
large of stray cattle, upon either of the four  
Public Squares, in the centre of the Borough,  
is hereby declared a nuisance, and any person  
or persons whose cattle shall be taken, so  
trespassing upon said Squares, or either of  
them, shall be subject to a fine of Five Dollars,  
to be recovered before any Justice of the  
Peace, in the name of the Mayor and Town  
Council, the one-half of which shall go to the  
person making the information to the Justice,  
and the other half to the Borough.

**Section 2.** If any cattle be found trespassing  
upon any of said Squares, above mentioned,  
any person or persons finding them shall be  
and they are hereby authorized to seize and  
detain them, until the above fine and costs  
are paid; And if the owner of the said cat-  
tle refuses to pay the same according to the  
judgment of the Justice of the Peace, within  
twenty-four hours after the time such judg-  
ment shall be rendered, then the said Justice  
shall have power to issue an order to the High  
Constable for the sale of the said cattle, or so  
much thereof as may be necessary to pay the  
said fine and costs.
