RELATING TO STRAY CATTLE.

Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Town Conneil of the Borough of Carlisle, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, That the running at large of stray cattle, upon either of the four Public Squares, in the centre of the Borovgh, is hereby declared a nuisance, and any person or persons whose cattle shall be taken, so trespassing upon said Squares, or either of them, shall be subject to a fine of Five Dollars, be recovered before any Justice of the Peace, as fines of like amount are recoverable, the one-half of which shall go to the
