ed as requested. S. A. HURLBUT, Maj. Gen. Rear of Vicksburg, May 20.—6 a. m — To the Hon, E. M. Stanton, Secretary of War: Gen. Grant won a great and momentous vicfory over the rebels under Pemberton, on the Jackson and Vicksburg road, at Baker's

creek, on the 16th inst.

Pemberton had a most formidable position on the crest of a wooded hill, over which the ad passes longitudinally. He had about 25,000 men. The battle began at 11 a.m.,

and was gained at 4 p. m.

Its brunt was borne by Hovey's division and M'Clearland's corps, and by Logan's and Croker's, of M'Pherson's. Hovey at acked the hill, and held the greater part of ttill 2 o'clock p. m., when, having lost sixteen indred men, lie was succeeded by Broomer's and Holmes' brigades, of Croaker's division, which the conflict was ended in that part the field. Boomer lost 500 men.
