The Gigantic Swindle.

The repeal of the Tonnage tax was a question before the people of this State in the fall of 1860. The Republican papers, without exception, also professed to oppose the repeal. It was well known that HENRY D. FOSTER, the Democratic canlidate for Governor, was opposed to this measure of wrong; it was known too that the Democrats in every county in the State, deounced the efforts the rail road was making to be relieved of the tax. The Republicans, knowing this to be the position of FOSTER and his friends, feared that the tax-payers might favor the Democratic ticket on this account, Hence it was that they too made great professions of hostility to the repeal of the tonnage tax. WHEREAS, The freedom of speech and of the press has ever been a cherished right founded as well in reason as in law, and charranteed to us by the Constitution of the United States as well as the Constitution of

Pennsylvania; And Whereas. Its maintainance is essential to the intelligent exercise of the elective fran And Whereas, Its abridgment or suppression

s a direct thrust at liberty, and in popular rovernment like ours, a tacit confession that he acts of those who attenut so inwarranta bly to distroy this sacred right will not stand he test of public discussion and the verdict of a free people; therefore:
Resolved, That freedom of speech and of the ipress is as necessary to the perpetuity of liberty as the freedom of the bullet-box, and that those who assail the rights of the forms

would hesitate to strike down the latter, and are equally the enemies of the people. Resolved, That we emphatically denounce every attempt to interfere with or abridge the liberty of speech or of the press, whether it be by the unlawful arrest and imprisonment of public speakers and editors, or by suppress ing newspapers by either mob violence or pretended civil or military authority. Resolved, That inasmuch as this liberty in-

terests every citizen, and its denial, abridge nent or distinction may affect him personally, we call upon all, without distinction of party to vindicate their high privileges in this behalf; and here we cannot but express our astonishment that Republican editors have not only stood by and seen this dearest of American rights violated, but have actually approve ed and endorsed the violation. Resolved, That, let others do as they may,

or ourselves we intend to stand up for our rights as American freemen; that we will never yield them; but will assert and maintain them by our voices; by our votes, and, if need be, by our lives.
Resolved, That the so-called rulers of the American people are but their agents; and to deny the right of the principals to direct, control or criticise the acts of their agents, is

as repugnant to the principle of law as of common sense. Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the President of the Convention to prepare and publish an address to the people of Pennsylvania on these important subjects

J. A. Fulton, R. W. Jones, & Committee B. F. MYERS, The Chairman of the Sate Central Committee having been introduced, some diseas ion took place upon the best made of circula-

ting political intelligence through the press of the State, and the proper disposition of party patronage—in which Messrs Ban, Jones, Neiman, Grayson, Ward, Kessler, Falton, and others, participatid. Messrs. Fulton, Grayson and Meylert, were appointed to propare an address pursuant to the resolution above passed. Mr. Jones offered the following, which was

ndopted:
Resolved, That the interests of the Democratic press of the State demand a thorough and effective organization; that an occasion friendly interchang of opinion and sentiment by its representatives, will give it harmony and strength; that, to this end, the Executive Committee be and is hereby instructed toap point a time and place, at least once a year, for a meeting of Editorial Convention. The Convention adjourned sine die.
